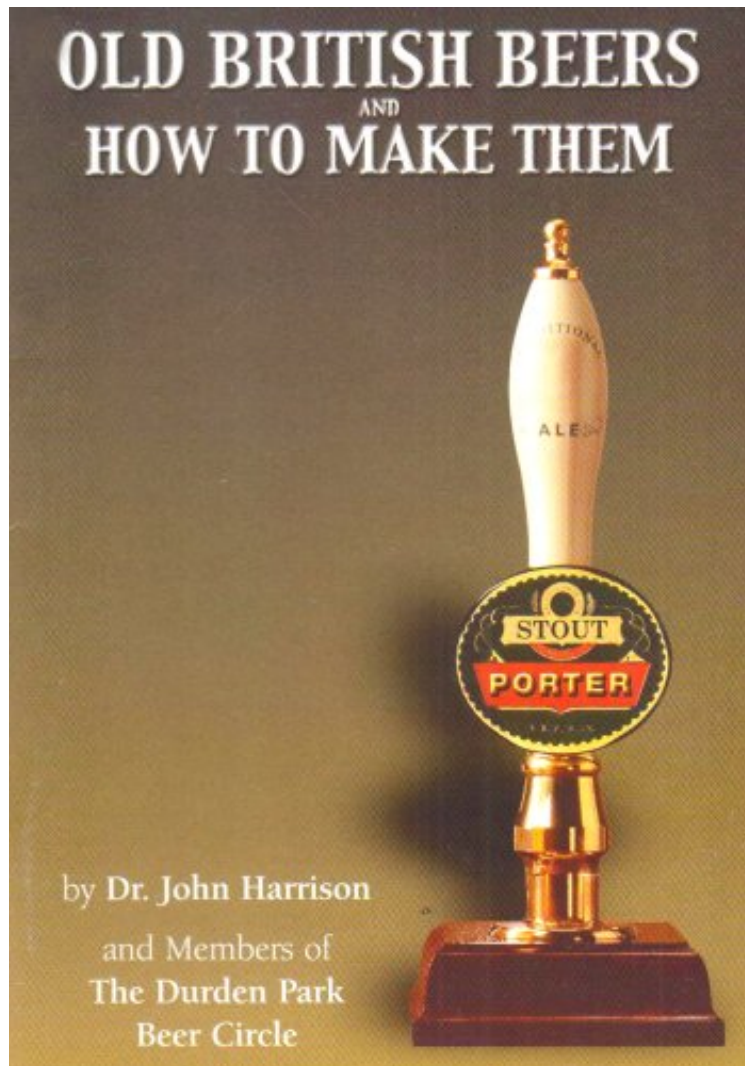

It is also a picture into the past of brewing. You can look at several recipes for the same style and they vary only a little, but only one may have a comment that it is a wonderful beer. This says that there is a sweet spot for every beer and only a few ever find it. It also shows that styles are more prone to marketing than to staying true to basic ingredients, ie - one man's Porter is another man's Stout. Aging is key to these beers which is why you will almost never see them produced by

commercial breweries and why they are so wonderful to make at home. Eight more months and we'll see if they are as wonderful in a glass as they are on paper. Old British Beers By Leon Anyone who's interested in brewing historical British beers will find this book of interest. It's not a history of beermaking, but a book of recipes--so it's mostly of interest to homebrewers. It has recipes going back to ca. 1300, which is pretty exciting for anyone looking to make really old beers. However, the number of really old recipes is very limited. As many historical types are aware, beer used to be bittered with various mixes of herbs (called gruit), rather than hops; unfortunately there are only three gruit ale recipes in the book. Still, that's not too bad considering how difficult it is to find really old beer recipes. The book's recipes are sized at one-gallon batches for ease of experimentation, but can be scaled up to a standard five gallons very easily.
