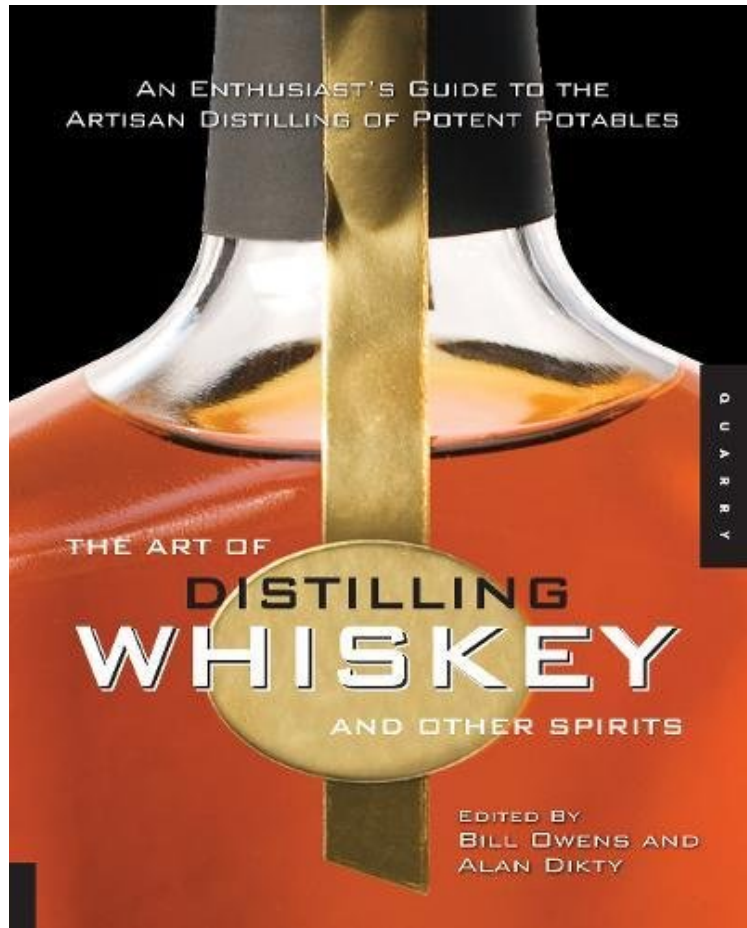

The whole of the book seems to have a playful and light tone about it as can be seen in a quote from Ovid along the lines of "There is more refreshment and stimulation in a nap, even of the briefest, than in all the alcohol ever distilled" At almost the very beginning of the book. The funny part? The author retorts with a cliff note about Ovid being a "Notorious wet blanket." It was almost immediately after reading that, that I knew the author and I were on the same page. Both very serious about our enjoyment of spirits and the magic therein with a chuckling seriousness about the subject of something so timeless that every man and woman across the span of the globe has been able to appreciate since the inception of distillation. Not at all about 'the art of distilling' By Phoenix Whilst this is a great book to learn about the general process, terms and history of distilling Whiskey it certainly doesn't live up to the publishers statement "explore the actual craft of distilling in such detail." In fact, it covers the craft in quite a cursory manner. That said, it would be an ideal coffee table book (can you have a kindle-based coffee table book?) or primer to the different spirit styles and histories.
