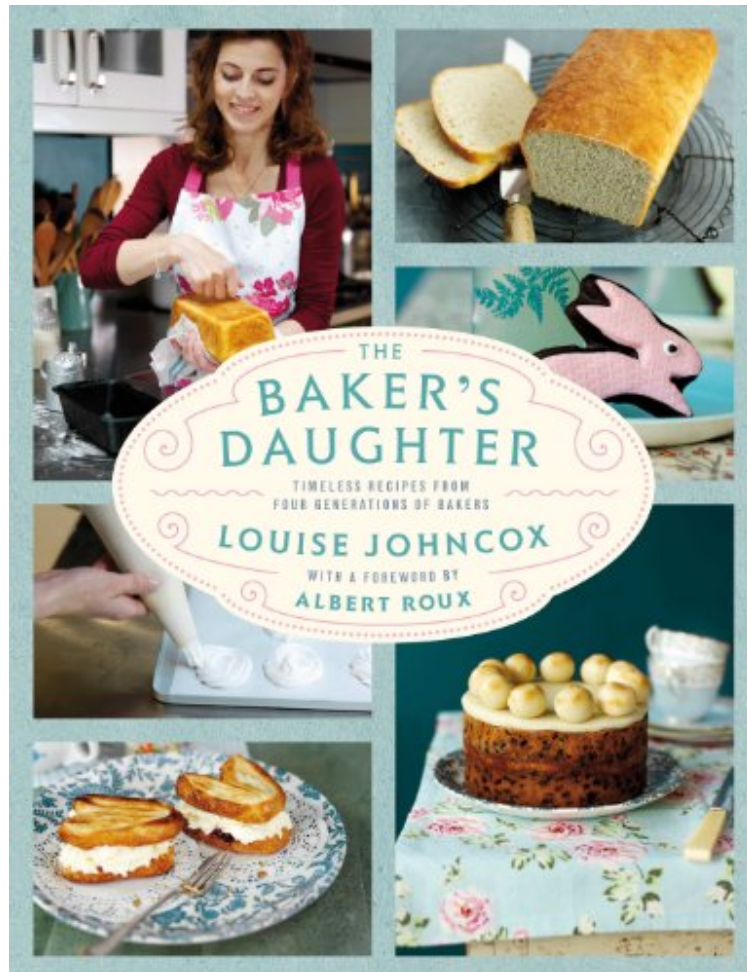

Louise Johncox, in her book the 'Baker's Daughter', achieves many of the salient writing principals that King laid out in his treatise. It is creative, unique and surprising in the way it weaves the touching story

of a baker and his family with truly loved recipes. It is not the typical 'nod and wink' at a few milestones in a family's history. The author manages to link very real family experiences and roots with an 'honest' array of recipes that were constants on the menu of her parent's tea shop. Having read the foreword and 'googled' the author I am not surprised to find that Louise Johncox combines backgrounds in journalism, academic writing with her immersion in the world of baking. Finally I just want to say that whoever was responsible for the design of the book deserves huge credit as it is a beautiful object. One for all lovers of books, cooking and true stories!
